THE CATHOLIC LIFE OF OUR SCHOOL

Have you ever noticed how we like to characterise different months and seasons? For example, January is painted as the longest, bluest month of the year – so much so that 'Blue Monday' is a term coined to refer to the third Monday in January. Other months and seasons similarly characterised include February – romance and playfulness due to Valentine's Day and being the shortest, quirkiest month; and October – pumpkin-spice and all things nice!

But these characterisations don't leave much room for nuance. Even the bluest Januarys will have some light, and the most playful of Februarys will have harder moments. And for most people, October doesn't consist of endless pumpkin-spice lattes!

This year, the month of March is taken up wholly with the Liturgical Season of Lent. In the Church, Lent is represented by the colour purple, worn by priests and seen on the altar. Purple, like the season of Lent, symbolises a time of prayer, penance and preparation for Jesus' death on the cross and Resurrection at Easter. It offers a chance for us to reflect on our relationship with God and make a fresh start as the Church focuses on the three pillars of Lent, almsgiving, fasting and prayer – or as children in school will know them, GIVE, ACT, PRAY

Children loved having their parents in for world book day. They enjoyed reading books and some activities. Don't worry if you missed it we will be opening up our classroom again soon!

YEAR 1 & 2

In Science, we have been learning about how seeds grow into plants. This week we explored seeds in different types of fruits. We enjoyed using the magnifying glasses to look at the seeds closely and help us to draw them scientifically.









YEAR 3

This week in year 3 we have been getting really messy. We have been bread tasting and making and this week we practiced many skills of the breadmaking process including combining flour and water to make dough and then kneading it. It was a messy afternoon but the children loved it.





YEAR 4

In Class 4, the children have been learning about earthquakes in Geography this week and understanding the different tectonic plates. Pupils have been learning about how earthquakes are caused and how the tectonic plates move within the Earth's crust.

The children did have a go at trying to piece the earth back together when separating the Earth by its tectonic plates. They gave this a good go. This is harder than it looks!







YEAR 5

Year 5 and I have been getting to know each other over the past two weeks.We have started a new topics in Geography (Climates across the world), Science (Earth and Space) and DT (Mechanical Structures). Some students are trying to raise money for the victims of the Turkey/Syrian earthquakes through a sponsored swim and run plus a toy and book sale next week. 

CPOMS and Operation encompass

At OLSP we use CPOMs as our system for recording information that we consider to be safeguarding information. As a parent you are entitled to see this information and may request to do so.

Operation Encompass is the reporting to schools, prior to the start of the next school day, when a child or young person has exposed to, or involved in, any domestic incident.

Operation Encompass will ensure that a member of the school staff, known as a Key Adult, is trained to allow them to liaise with the police and to use the information that has been shared, in confidence, while ensuring that the school is able to make provision for possible difficulties experienced by children, or their families, who have been involved in, or exposed to, a domestic abuse incident.
